

Copenhagen and the demise of Green Utopia

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The failure of the UN climate summit in Copenhagen is a historical watershed that marks the beginning of the end of climate hysteria. Not only does it epitomise the failure of the EU's environmental policy, it also symbolises the loss of Western dominance.

The failure of the climate summit was not only predictable - it was inevitable. There was no way out from the cul-de-sac into which the international community had manoeuvred itself. The global deadlock simply reflects the contrasting, and in the final analysis irreconcilable, interests of the West and the rest of the world. The result is likely to be an indefinite moratorium on international climate legislation. After Copenhagen, the chances for a binding successor of the Kyoto Protocol are as good as zero.

The extent of the debacle and the shift in the balance of geopolitical power was demonstrated by the fact that the final accord was made without the participation of the European Union. The exclusion of Europe is a remarkable symbol of the EU's growing loss of influence, a green bureaucracy that was not even asked whether they agreed with the non-binding declaration of China, India and the USA. Although the Copenhagen conference was held in a European capital, the negotiations and the final result of the conference were totally outside European involvement.

2009: COPENHAGEN AND THE ORIGINS OF THE 'BRICS' ALLIANCE

True-blooded advocates of Realpolitik who hardly exist in the climate policy debate, had warned for a long time that Copenhagen would fail to bridge the divergent interests of the West and the developing countries. For political realists, it is no surprise whatever that all key decisions were postponed indefinitely. What is more, there is little doubt that China and India are the big winners of the Copenhagen climate poker. The two emerging superpowers managed to win new strategic allies, even among Western nations. China's and India's strategy to align themselves with other developing countries in opposition to protectionist threats by the US and the EU proved itself as very successful. In the end, their persistent "No" even forced the Obama administration to join the anti-green alliance.


















How To Rescind The Endangerment Finding In A Way That Will Stick

- As discussed in my previous post, one of President Trump's first-day Executive Orders the one entitled "Unleashing American Energy" directed a reconsideration of EPA's so-called "Endangerment Finding" (EF) of 2009. The EF is the EPA regulatory action where it claimed to determine that CO2 and other "greenhouse gases" qualify as "pollutants" under the Clean Air Act because they are a "danger to public health and welfare." President Trump's January 20 EO directs that EPA, within 30 days, submit "recommendations to the Director of OMB on the legality and continuing applicability of the Administrator's findings."
- Since the EF is the foundation underlying all the Biden-era regulations restricting and suppressing fossil fuels, you can be sure that any attempt to eliminate it will be met with a full-bore litigation attack from the forces of the crazy left.
- Can the EF really be rescinded in a way that will stand up to these attacks?
- Absolutely, it can.

Can EPA overturn the CO2 'Endangerment Finding' this time?

take on more than needs to be taken on. To rescind the EF, EPA does not need to contend that GHGs will not or cannot cause any global warming. Rather, they can put the burden of proof on the other side to show that GHGs emitted under EPA's regulatory jurisdiction will inevitably cause *dangerous* warming. EPA need only conclude that there is no sufficient proof of that.

Framed in that way, this is not a complicated or difficult task. There are hundreds of scientific papers in the peer reviewed literature since 2009 accumulating empirical evidence that the dangers predicted 15 years ago have not happened. For example:

- There have been no upward trends in hurricanes, droughts, floods, tornadoes, wild fires, or other dangerous weather events.
- Sea level has not risen beyond the slow rate of rise over the prior century.
- Sea ice has not declined as predicted. The Greenland and Antarctic ice sheets have not meaningfully changed.

G7: Climate finance conditional on China & emerging nations

G7 to demand wealthy developing nations pay up on climate change

Move by leaders of rich nations puts them on collision course with China, India and Saudi Arabia after UN talks end in failure



A G7 draft communique, seen by the Financial Times, indicates the world's largest economies will agree they need to provide financing for poorer nations, but will also call on states that are classed as developing but are more advanced economically to pay up.

"We emphasise that the G7 countries intend to be leading contributors to a fit-for-purpose [climate finance] goal, underlining the importance of including those countries that are capable of contributing in any international public finance mobilisation," the draft says.

The existing \$100bn annual goal was set more than a decade ago but was <u>finally</u> reached two years late in 2022, according to the OECD, only after including reclassified loans.

Ahead of the upcoming world climate conference, the EU will continue to insist that China and other large emitting countries pay their fair share of climate finance – but how remains subject to discussion.
